

The DAR Museum was established in 1890, the year the NSDAR was founded. Its collection includes about 30,000 decorative and fine arts objects made or used in America before the Industrial Revolution, including furniture, silver, ceramics, and textiles. The objects are displayed in two galleries and 31 period rooms. The rooms trace the development of home, business, and social life in early America and reveal how lifestyles have changed over 300 years.

Become a part of an elite team of historians in the first annual Junior Historian Camp. This one-week camp explores objects at the DAR Museum and in the Presidents Park/White House area as Junior Historians learn about history, the importance of preservation, and the jobs and tools needed.
