CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS ESSAY CONTEST 2006-2007**

**(This information is for chapter and school use)**

<b>TOPIC:</b>	<b>2006-2007 topic is: "At Sea or at Home: Different Perspectives on the Voyage to the New World."</b> Relate the story of the first expedition of Columbus viewed from the perspective of one of the following: an ordinary seaman, Queen Isabella, or a shipboard rat.
<b>PARTICIPANTS:</b>	<b>All students in grades 9-12 are eligible.</b> This contest is conducted without regard to race, religion, sex or national origin. <b>DO NOT SUBMIT A STUDENT PHOTOGRAPH WITH ENTRY.</b>
<b>LENGTH:</b>	Length is to be <i>no more</i> than 750 words.
<b>FORM:</b>	<p>Essay must be typed, or prepared on a computer or word processor, using black type in a non-script font no smaller than 12 point or larger than 14 point. A limited vision student may use Braille, a tape recorder, or very large type. A written transcript must be included, as well as a teacher's or physician's letter attesting to the student's special need.</p> <p>All of the essay must be the student's original work.</p> <p>Each essay must have a title page listing the following:</p> <p align="center"><b>Title of essay – "At Sea or at Home: Different Perspectives on the Voyage to the New World"</b></p> <p align="center">Contestant's full name and address. (Street, RR, PO Box, City, State, Zip Code)          Contestant's telephone number (with area code) and e-mail address if available          Name of contestant's school and grade level          Name of sponsoring DAR chapter          Number of words in essay</p> <p><i>Any essay without a title page will be disqualified.</i></p>
<b>BIBLIOGRAPHY:</b>	<b>Essay must have a bibliography listing all references utilized. Internet resources, if used, should be cited in similar format to that used for printed resources. Add the electronic address used to access the document as supplementary information.</b> Any essay with information copied directly from sources without using quotes will be disqualified.
<b>JUDGING AND AWARDS:</b>	<p><b>Judging will be based on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, punctuation, and neatness. Pictures, maps, drawings, graphics, and other such additions will not be considered in judging and should not be included.</b></p> <p>CHAPTER: One essay is selected as the chapter winner and forwarded for the state competition. Certificates may be presented by sponsoring chapter.</p> <p>STATE: One essay is selected as the state winner and forwarded to the Division Vice Chairman of American History for division competition. Certificate presented by state.</p> <p>DIVISION: One essay is selected as the division winner and forwarded to the National Vice Chairman in Charge of the Columbus Essay Contest. National divisional winners will be recognized.</p> <p>NATIONAL: One essay is selected as the national winner. Judging at the national level is conducted by the National Italian American Foundation. The <b>national winner</b> will receive \$1,200 from the NIAF in addition to paid lodging and transportation to Washington, D.C. in October 2007 or the winner and one parent or guardian. The national winner must read the prize-winning essay at the Columbus Memorial, Washington, DC on Columbus Day (October 8, 2007). The second place national winner will receive \$500, and the third place national winner will receive \$300.</p> <p>(Chapters and States may present monetary awards and/or gifts in addition to the certificates if desired. DAR American Essay Medals are <b>not</b> authorized for this contest.)</p> <p><b>Note: All essays must first be submitted to a local chapter. Essays sent directly to the National Chairman or Vice Chairman of the Columbus Contest will not be considered.</b></p>
<b>DEADLINE:</b>	Chapter Chairmen should determine date for students/schools to forward essays to them to allow for judging to be completed prior to state deadline. <i>States with district level judging should set appropriate intermediate deadlines. Date</i>
