

'CAPT. MOLLY' IS REBURIED.

Remains of Revolution Heroine Are Laid to Rest at West Point.

HIGHLAND FALLS, N. Y., March 16 (AP).—The remains of Margaret Corbin, the "Captain Molly Pitcher" of Revolutionary fame, were removed today from their resting place of more than a century, on the Highland Falls estate of J. Pierpont Morgan, and reinterred in the Post Cemetery at West Point, with appropriate services.

The Rev. Roland J. Bunten, rector of the Church of the Holy Innocents of this village, read the committal service at the new grave. Delegations of the Daughters of the American Revolution from New York and Albany, headed by Mrs. Alton B. Parker, were present. The Daughters of the American Revolution were responsible for the removal of the body. They will dedicate a monument over "Captain Molly's" grave next month, and will also unveil a tablet to her memory in the Church of the Holy Innocents here.

"Captain Molly," the first American woman to take a soldier's part in the war for independence, fought in the battle of Fort Washington, Nov. 16, 1776. Her husband, a gunner, was wounded and she served his canon until she herself was wounded.
