Household Expenses

The following pages come from Madam Johnson's Present: Or, Every Young Woman's Companion, in Useful and Universal Knowledge, published in Dublin in 1770.

While the expenses were applicable to Great Britain and may be slightly different for the American colonies, it will give you an idea of the kinds of expenses people had at the time and the relative worth of various items and services.

America used the monetary system of Great Britain (although they also supplemented their coins with those from many different countries). Prices were calculated in pounds (I.), shillings (s.), pence (d.), and farthings (f.).

1 pound = 20 shillings

1 shilling = 12 pence (plural of penny)

1 penny = 4 farthings
