Our Nations Symbols - US Symbols

1. Identify the standards to be addressed:

SC Standards Grade 3 or Special Needs
Standard 1: Utilize the college and career skills of a historian to study the continuity and changes over time in the United States.

2.H.1 Identify and compare significant historical events, moments, and symbols in U.S. history. This indicator was developed to encourage inquiry into historical events, including figures, symbols, and observances, that have been important to the U.S. over time as well as how they impact us.

2. Statement of the objective and lesson outcomes:

Student will identify important American symbols and explain their meaning.

3. Materials, resources, and technology to be used by teacher/students:

American symbols booklet-one for each student
Our American Symbols Power Point
Teacher computer with display-Smartboard, Promethean Board, Etc.. OR charts
Pencils

4. Introduction of the topic:

- 1. Tell students that today they will be learning about some of the most important symbols in the United States of America.
- 2. Ask students if they can define symbol. After discussion, define, and record, if necessary, a symbol as an item that represents something else.

5. Procedure for instruction:

- 3. Ask students if they can name any American symbols. Help guide them through this discussion by naming items such as the bald eagle, the American flag, the Liberty Bell, The White House, and the Statue of Liberty.
- 4. Pass out the booklets. Have them put together beforehand.
- 5. Display the Powerpoint "Our American Symbols". Display the slide with just the picture of the bald eagle. Ask the children if they can identify the symbol in the picture. See if they can tell you anything about that symbol that you are showing them. Next, read the corresponding slide that goes along with that symbol. Have students fill in the RED words on the page of each symbol in their booklets. Continue doing the same. Make sure to go through all six symbols with the corresponding slides.

6. Lesson Closure

Go around the room and ask students to tell you their favorite symbol that we talked about and why.


7. Assessment of Understanding:

The Liberty Bell


- The liberty bell is located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
