6. Procedure for instruction

- Timelines are a skill that crosses language arts, science, and social studies. It can be a graphic source of nonfiction texts that helps students understand the material better. When students are asked to create a timeline, it takes this learning into a creative way to share their knowledge.
- Timelines can be made in many different way, depending on the grade level teacher may want to give students a choice of how they share their knowledge of the US Flag timeline.
- Looking back to our first flag is a great way to celebrate American 250.

7. Lesson closure


- Students will design a flag timeline showing at least our first flag and our current flag.

Flag of Washington facts for kids



The flag of Washington consists of the state seal, displaying an image of its namesake George Washington, on a field of dark green with gold fringe being optional. It is the only U.S. state flag with a field of green as well as the only

state flag with the image of an American president. The Secretary of State regulates flag protocol related to the state flag, as well approving replica flags for commercial sale and other standards related to the flag.

The flag was officially adopted on March 5, 1923, and has been a symbol of Washington ever since. Washington had achieved statehood in 1889, but did not have an official flag at the time. The Washington chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution designed the flag in 1915 and campaigned for its adoption by the Washington State Legislature in the early 1920s. The state flag has undergone minor revisions since its adoption, including the use of standardized colors in 1955 and a modernized seal in 1967.

The Road Map Timeline. In this fun example, students take a poster board or a piece of butcher paper and draw a road. Then, they create street signs to represent the dates and use cars to represent the event. In the example below, we made the cars so they lift up, and under them is where we described the event in detail.



8. Assessment of student understanding
