

"Jamestown & the Original People"

Lesson Plan

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Grade Level: 9-12

## 1. Identify the standards to be addressed:

Understanding the chronology of the Historic Triangle & how it relates to our nation's birth- CCSS-RH-10.3. Describe the establishment, development, & historic significance of Jamestown - CCSS-RH-10.3.

## 2. Statement of the objective and lesson outcomes:

Students learn basic facts about Captain John Smith, Pocahontas, Chief Powhatan, John Rolfe, The First Africans, The First General Assembly, and Jane & Cannibalism as they influenced the development of Jamestown.

### 3. Materials, resources, and technology to be used by teacher/students:

A basic website to start the students; access 4 additional Internet resources; Chromebooks, computers, or access to a computer lab for research. Included worksheet for notes, paper, and index cards for facts. Pens & copy machine

### 4. Introduction of the topic:

How interpersonal relationships fit into Jamestown story, how these people influenced the development of Jamestown, & how their contributions, gifts, and skills were used to make Jamestown succeed.

## 5. Procedure for instruction:

Teacher discusses the different people by showing a DVD of "American Began". Students take notes on the people listed using the response questions. Students visit the library to find additional information using note taking aids for additional sources. Students should include pictures with sited sources.

#### 6. Lesson closure:

Explain in writing how each group's interpersonal relationships influenced the development of Jamestown using effective and accurate information, correct English, multiple sources, and well developed organization & analysis. Use attached rubric to assess student work showing how each group interacted as well as their influences on Jamestown.

Use attached rubric to assess student work showing how each group interacted as well as their influences on Jamestown.

Summary: Facts about Capt. John Smith are found on this site. Who was Captain John Smith according to these facts? What leadership skills did he possess and how did they contribute to the success of Jamestown? How was he important to the survival of the colony? What were his contributions? Who were his associates?

2. Pocahontas and Chief Powhattan Jamestown Rediscovery by Historic Jamestown Visitors Center

Summary: Facts about Pocahontas and Chief Powhattan are found on this site. What interest did Pocahontas have for the people of Jamestown? What stability did she provide? Who was her father?
