Patriots - Red, White or Blue?

1. Identify the standards to be addressed:

Grade 1 – Missouri – Addresses State Standard

4.H.3.C The Student will identity historically significant individuals who contributed to early American (not yet established country)

4.RI.6.D Content includes analyzing how culture has been maintained over time through celebration, tradition, and memorials. (examples includes US Flag)

2. Statement of the objective and lesson outcomes:

The students will read a table and discuss the meaning of the colors of the US flag. The student will read 10 descriptions of patriots in the Revolutionary War who demonstrated one or more of the flag colors' meanings by their actions. See the attached documents (worksheet activity: "Patriots: Red, White or Blue?" and the answer key).

3. Materials, resources, and technology to be used by teacher/students:

A picture of the original flag of the US, an US Flag, handouts of the worksheet activity (Patriots: Red, White or Blue?"), worksheet activity answer key. Optional if available: color book pages from the DAR publication - Our Patriots: The Men and Women Who Achieved American Independence - A coloring book and colors.

4. Introduction of the topic:

Ask the student what their school colors and mascot are. Ask them why they wear those colors at ball games. Ask the students what their country's colors are. Point out the colors on the original flag and current US flag. Explain how the original flag has 13 stars for the first 13 colonies and the current flag has 50 stars for the 50 states. Explain that each color has a special meaning for both patriots during the revolutionary war and apply to our daily lives today as citizens.

5. Procedure for instruction:

Pass out the activity handout, "Patriots: Red, White or Blue?" Go over the directions and table on the front page. The table describes the meaning of the flag colors. Then have students work in pairs to do the activity on the back page. If available, provide students a copy of the DAR Coloring Book pages to read and color. Preferably pages of the patriots from the worksheet answer key.

6. Assessment of Understanding:

Have students explain why demonstrating these flag colors in our country's past, present and future is important for everyone's wellbeing.

Directions:

- 1. Read the table below that describes what the colors of the American flag represent.
- 2. Read each provided statement on the back about a known Revolutionary War patriot. Decide which flag color the patriot best represents by their actions.
- 3. Place the letter for the color in the provided space next to the statement. **R** for red, **W** for white and **B** for blue. In some cases, more than one flag color may be used.

Color Meanings	Definitions	Descriptions
Red – "Hardiness and valor"	Hardiness – The ability to endure difficult situations Valor – Great courage in the face of danger; especially battle	Being brave
White – "Purity and innocence"	Purity – Free of alteration (change) or contamination Innocence – Lack of corruption	Thinking of others instead of oneself
Blue "Vigilance, perseverance and justice"	Vigilance – The act or state of being careful and watching for possible danger or difficulty Perseverance – Doing something despite of difficulty or delay in achieving success Justice – The quality of being fair and responsible	Reing Truthful Never giving up NOTE: The stars on the flag represent the number of states in the USA. The first flag had 13 stars for the 13 colonies. Today the USA flag has 50 stars for the 50 states. The 13 alternate white and red stripes represent the original 13 colonies.

Part 2: Read the following information about a patriot and mark the poem as instructed.

Mary Ludwig Hays McCauley went with her husband to an encampment in New Jersey during the Revolutionary War. He was a gunner. During a hot day in June 1778, she took countless pitchers of water to the soldiers. Her husband collapsed and she took his place as a gunner firing at the British. She is nicknamed "Molly Pitcher".

Read the following poem called "Molly Pitcher" that was written by Ethel Barnett de Vito and published in the Extension magazine in July 1943. After reading the poem go back and place a "R" next to any line that shows her bravery and "W" next to any line that shows her thinking of others rather than herself. Not all lines will be marked.

- The poem conveys Molly as both brave and modest. How do military families stand behind military service men today and show sacrifices in modern times?
- How can you demonstrate the colors of the flag in your daily life?
