### **National Service:**

As Oregon State Regent, Nancy Slagle has enthusiastically participated in National Board of Management meetings and voting. She is excited about continuing to be involved at the national level.

### **State and Chapter Service:**

Mrs. Slagle's theme during her state regent term is "Peace, Harmony, and Unity for a Better America" with emphasis on supporting music therapy programs for Oregon veterans, and providing ADA compliant restrooms at Newell Pioneer Village, an Oregon Society-owned museum.

Mrs. Slagle and her sisters are first-generation DAR Daughters. She was vice regent and chapter regent for Oregon's Celilo Chapter. She held the state treasurer position for two terms, was state second vice regent while concurrently serving as chapter regent, was state first vice regent, and now state regent. She chaired and participated in state committees: Finance, Financial Planning, Yearbook, State Conference Planning, and the museums' Buildings and Grounds Committees. Significant events occurring during this time that required her involvement included Schmink Museum ownership transfer, Pioneer Mothers Memorial Cabin relocation, and Caples House Museum's foundation replacement.

### **Non-DAR Information:**

Born and raised in California, her father was in the military and then civil service at a naval air station. Her family came to Oregon from Iowa, North Carolina, Kentucky, and Nebraska. Mrs. Slagle's great-grandparents farmed in the Hood River Valley, and that is where she returned after spending 35 years in Alaska, mostly working for the State of Alaska.

Mrs. Slagle received a bachelor's degree in business, majored in accounting, minored in economics, from Oregon State University, and qualified and worked as a certified public accountant. Her state positions were in accounting, budgeting, and finance, and included five years with the Legislature, three years as director of the Governor's Office of Management and Budget, and 13 years as director of Administrative Services for the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities.

She is a past president of a Rotary club in Juneau, Alaska, a certified Master Gardener, and has held the offices of treasurer of the Master Gardener association, treasurer of an orchestra association, and secretary of the local garden club, and was the county representative on the Oregon State University Extension Citizens Advisory Network and a member of the Hood River County budget committee.
