Myra Colby Bradwell (1831-1894) attorney, first woman admitted to Illinois bar, 1892

Madeline Breckinridge (1872-1920) social reformer, suffragist

Sophonisba Breckinridge (1866-1948) attorney, suffragist, social reformer, first woman to pass Kentucky bar exam

Jennie Brownscombe (1850-1936) painter

Linda Sue Cobb Bruckheimer (b. 1945) philanthropist, writer, editor, historic preservation activist

Barbara Pierce Bush (b. 1925) first lady, 1989-1993

Julia Cantacuzene-Grant (1876-1975) President Grant's granddaughter, author, married into Russian nobility

Lillian H. Coit (1844-1929) philanthropist, benefactor of San Francisco fire department

Mary Baker Eddy (1821-1910) founded Christian Science Church (1879) and Christian Science Monitor (1908)

Mina Miller Edison (1865-1947) second wife of Thomas A. Edison, philanthropist, conservationist

Julie Nixon Eisenhower (b. 1948) author, editor, lecturer, daughter of Richard M. Nixon

Mamie Geneva Doud Eisenhower (1896-1979) first lady, 1953-1961  
Maud Howe Elliott (1854-1948) Pulitzer Prize for biography, 1917  
Marsha J. Evans (b. 1947) former US Navy admiral, Red Cross president, 2002-2005  
Rebecca Latimer Felton (1835-1930) 1<sup>st</sup> woman US senator, 1922  
Penny Sanford Fikes (b. 1962) porcelain artist

Phoebe Apperson Hearst (1842-1919) mother of William Randolph Hearst, founded first US kindergarten  
and the PTA  
Caroline Maria Hewins (1846-1926) author, noted children's librarian  
Ima Hogg (1882-1975) philanthropist, patron of the arts  
Grace Hopper (1906-1992) admiral, US Navy, author of COBOL computer language  
Julia Ward Howe (1819-1910) author, women's rights advocate, composer of *Battle Hymn of the  
Republic*  
Anna Hyatt Huntington (1876-1973) sculptor, philanthropist  
Kay Bailey Hutchison (b. 1943) U.S. Senator, Texas, elected 1993, to date the only woman elected to the  
Senate from Texas  
Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) recognized as founder of Mother's Day holiday in the US  
Virginia Ellis Jenckes (1877-1975) first woman elected to Congress from Indiana, 1932  
Annie Fellows Johnston (1863-1931) writer, author of "Little Colonel" series  
Frances Benjamin Johnston (1864-1952) photographer  
Frances Eliza Osborne Kellogg (1876-1956) businesswoman, entrepreneur  
Lee Kessler (b. 1947) writer, playwright, television actress

Ruth Bryan Rohde (c. 1884-1954) daughter of William Jennings Bryan, member of Congress, Minister to Denmark  
Edith Carow Roosevelt (1861-1948) first lady, 1901-1909  
Eleanor Roosevelt Roosevelt (1884-1962) first lady, 1933-1945  
Lucy Maynard Salmon (1853-1927) teacher, historian, first woman member of American Historical Association's executive committee  
Princess Agnes Winona Leclercq Joy Salm-Salm (1844-1912) author, adventurer, Prussian Medal of Honor winner  
Phyllis Schlafly (b. 1924) outspoken anti-feminist  
Margaret Seddon (b. 1947) medical doctor (surgeon) and astronaut

Margaret Chase Smith (1897-1995) Congressperson, Senator, nominee for US president
