# **Indigenous Marylanders**

- No federally recognized tribes
- 3 state recognized tribes
  - Accohnnock
  - Piscataway-Conoy
  - Piscataway
- General committee at state level to interact with non-recognized state tribal groups

### **Birth Records**

- Earliest records 1640
- 1654-1776- Episcopal Vestry's clerks required to record all births, regardless of parents' religion
- 1800-1864- didn't require recording of any birth information. Churches continue to record births & baptisms
- 1865-1884- records recorded at county level only, assigned to circuit court
- 1898-1972- state requires registration of all births at county, 1914 on high compliance
- 1973 on- state records all births

## **Marriage Records**

- Earliest records 1640
- 1640-1776- clergy required to post banns & keep marriage registers
- 1695- Episcopal Church mandated to record all marriages
- 1777-1864- clerk of court required to record licenses [not actual marriages]
- 1865-1885- county clerk required to record all vital events, including marriages
- 1886-1913- marriage license applications required
- 1914 on- state records all marriage records
- 1989-2004- SSNs on marriage records, each one must be requested & redacted individually
- Common places to elope: Elkton, Cecil County, MD; Howard County, MD (DC Residents)
  - MD Residents go to: Manassas, Prince William Co, VA; West Alexander, Washington Co, PA; Pittsburgh, Allegheny Co, PA

### **Death Records**

- Earliest records 1640
- 1654-1694- burials recorded by churches, usually include date of death. County court records include deaths ONLY for Charles, Somerset, Talbot counties.
- 1695-1864- Episcopal Church records all deaths; only churches record deaths
- 1865-1884- county circuit courts record deaths, low compliance levels
- 1898-1972- state requires county death records, Baltimore city keeps their own records
- 1972 on- state records all death records at Division of Vital Records

# **Adoption Records**

- All adoptions from before June 1, 1947, are considered "OPEN" unless sealed by adoptee
- All adoptions after this date are sealed, Need court-appointed intermediary/ court order
- To request record, you need county/city and date of adoption from Equity Indexes, see https://guide.msa.maryland.gov/pages/viewer.aspx?page=adoption

## Military Records (MD-Specific, also check federal records)

- 1. Colonial Wars (1689-1763)
  - a. Maryland Muster Rolls, Fort Cumberland, 1757-58
  - b. Colonial Soldiers of the South 1732-1774 by Murtie June Clark
  - c. Marylanders and Delawareans in French & Indian War, 1756-1763 by Henry C. Peden Jr
    - i. Use as finding aid, make sure to check original sources
  - d. State archives has original military records
- 2. Revolutionary War (1775-1783)
  - a. Maryland Militia in the Revolutionary War by Clements & Wright
  - b. Loyalists in the Southern Campaign of the Revolutionary War Vol 2 by Murtie June Clark
  - c. Orderly Book of the "Maryland Loyalists Regiment"
  - d. Archives of MD "Red Books" 1748-1827
    - i. Recommendations, petitions, requests, military intelligence reports, commissions, resolutions
    - ii. Correspondence within state
  - e. Archives of MD "Blue Books" 1706-1821
    - Oaths of fidelity, accounts of property taken by the British, military supplies, petitions requesting exemption from military service, and resolutions concerning state payments
    - ii. Correspondence to Congress
  - f. MD 400- https://msamaryland400.com/
  - g. Use Peden as finding aids, then go to original sources
    - i. Included people refusing to serve, deserters, secondary sources
  - h. Betty Carothers' 9000 Men Who Took the Oath of Allegiance and Fidelity to Maryland During the Revolution is OK for residence, not service
    - i. Includes men who refused to sign oath

- 3. War of 1812 (1812-1815)
  - a. The British Invasion of Maryland 1812-1815 by William M. Marine
  - b. Maryland Militia, War of 1812 by F. Edward Wright
  - c. Citizen Soldiers at North Point and Fort McHenry
- 4. Mexican War (1846-1848)
  - a. Maryland and District of Columbia Volunteers in the Mexican War by Charles J. Wells
- 5. Civil War (1862-1865)
  - a. Marylanders on both sides of war; check federal service records
  - b. Union
    - i. Archives of Maryland, Volumes 367 [Part 1] and 365 [Part 2]
      - 1. Part 1- Army, Cavalry, Artillery
      - 2. Part 2- Navy, Marines, Colored Troops

  - c. Confederate
    - i. FindmyPast- Records of Confederate POWs

- 1790-1805: federal-level records put DC as part of MD

#### **Record Losses**

Allegany- Marriages 1791-1847; Naturalizations 1892-1893

Anne Arundel- Nearly every court record pre-1704; deeds pre-1699 (some re-recorded)

Calvert- almost all court records pre-1882; some deeds 1840-1882 re-recorded, abstracts 1784-1882 in Annapolis

Caroline- 1790 census

Carroll- most "early" papers- see Frederick Co for coverage

Cecil & Charles- many "early" court records

Dorchester- assorted pre-1852 gaps

Frederick- 1783 tax list

Harford- some pre-1858 records

Kent- some pre-1720 records

Montgomery & Prince George's- 1830 census

Somerset- 1790, 1830 censuses

St. Mary's- most deeds pre-1831 (some abstracts in Annapolis); 1830 census. Overall substantial record loss

Talbot- many court records

Washington- some pre-1871 court records

Worcester- some pre-1893 records
